This enquiry is focussed on Shabbat – the day of rest in the Jewish religion.

The Jewish Holy books (Tenakh) contain core beliefs and stories including the Creation Story in which God creates the world in six days and rests on the seventh – the

Jews believe that there is only one God, and he is sacred (Holy).

- In the Genesis account (Chapter 1) within the Bible, God gives the first humans the responsibility to look after the world He has created:
- "Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it. Rule over the fish in the sea and the birds in the sky and over every living creature that moves on the ground."

- concept of **incarnation**: God becoming man or literally being "made flesh".
- The star in the sky symbolises Jesus' importance and how he could be a light for other nations. The gifts show that Jesus was a type of both king and God, and would die
- the Jewish

- God gave them a Holy Book called the Torah
- The 10 commandments are a set of rules that tells them how to live their lives in a way that pleases God.
- These rules are found in the Torah and were given to Moses

- Jesus (his son) and the Holy Spirit
- Palm Sunday is the day where Jesus rode into Jerusalem. He fulfilled Old Testament prophecies which said that this would happen when the "king" came.
- Sabbath. As the Jewish weeks start on a Sunday, Saturday is the 7th day, the day of rest – Shabbat.
- The law books attributed to Moses include the 10 commandments

 one of these is to 'Honour the Sabbath'.
- Shabbat (Sabbath) is celebrated both in the home and the synagogue and the main requirement is that no work should be attempted from sunset on Friday until sunset on Saturday.
- The start of Shabbat is marked with a special meal and ceremony in the home.
- When worshipping, Jews wear a skull cap called a

- · Yad- A special pointer used when reading the Torah
- · Ark-A large cupboard facing Jerusalem. It holds the Torah and is the holiest place in the synagogue.
- · Ner tamid- hangs above the ark. It is a light that never goes out. It is a symbol that God is eternal or present.
- · Bimah- This is a raised platform with a reading desk where the Torah is read.
- Rabbi- A Jewish religious teacher. They lead services at the synagogue
- Siddur -Prayer book
- · Mezuzah-small rectangular shaped box which can be found on the doorframe of Jewish people's homes. It contains the Shema prayer which is a prayer for Jewish people to remember God.

Coverage

Autumn 1 Is it possible to be kind to everyone all of the time? (enquiry 1)

This enquiry investigates how Christians might follow Jesus' example of being kind to people.

Autumn 2 Why do Christians believe God gave Jesus the world? (enquiry 2)

This enquiry investigates the Christian belief in Jesus as a gift of love to humanity.

Spring 1 Enquiry 1 (Islam) Who is God to Muslims?

In this unit, we will look at what Muslims think about Allah and why he is so special to them.

Spring 2 How important is it to

Christians that Jesus
came back to life after his
crucifixion?
(enquiry 3)

This enquiry examines the events of Easter Sunday, Jesus' resurrection, and the impact this has on Christians today.

Summer 1 How important is the prophet Muhammad to Muslims? (Enquiry 2)

In this unit, we will look at the prophet Muhammad. A man chosen by Allah to be his messenger.

Summer 2 How important is the Qu'ran to Muslims? (Enquiry 3)

In this unit, we will look at the Muslim holy book, the Qur'an. To Muslims this book contains the words of Allah.

Knowledge

The learning is based on Jesus summing up the 10 commandments from the Old Testament into two commandments.

"'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength.' The second is this: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' There is no commandment greater than these." Mark 12:30-31

Trinity: complete relationship between God (the Father), Jesus (his son) and the Holy Spirit. The three are "consubstantial", which means that they exist separately and together as one.

God became incarnate at Christmas and bought God's love for the world to earth in human form.

This enquiry also reflects the concept of salvation:

Muslims believe that Allah is perfect. He is the one who made human beings, the one who watches them during life and the one who decides what happens when life is over.

Allah should be the most important thing in a Muslim's life – for this reason many Muslims do things every day to make sure they remember Allah like praying 5 times a day. The prayer times are often at difficult times, but this is

Christians believe that Jesus was put to death on a cross and remember this event on Good Friday. They believe that after he died, he was put into a tomb with a stone rolled across the doorway (so something that could not easily be moved especially from the inside).

On Easter Sunday, visitors to the tomb (one being Mary Magdalene who was a follower of Jesus) found it empty. Mary then This enquiry looks at the life of the prophet Muhammad and the part he played in the start of Islam.

The Prophet Muhammad is a key person for Muslims. Born and raised in Makkah, Saudi Arabia, he was chosen by Allah (God) to be his messenger. The words Allah gave to Muhammad were later written down and became the Holy Qur'an.

The Qur'an is the holy book for Muslims, but it is also believed to be the actual words of Allah spoken in Arabic, the language chosen by Allah. It is treated with areat care.

Many Muslims take lessons in how to speak Arabic, including schoolchildren. These classes are often taught in the Mosque, the Muslim place of worship.
